YOUR GIFT – THE HELP IT CAN GIVE

Any gift, irrespective of size, will make a difference. Many of our recent developments have been funded partly or entirely by legacies.

Examples of how a gift can be used:

- £1,000 will buy a new set of period enamel signs
- £5,000 will buy a set of brass gauges and fittings for a locomotive
- £10,000 will buy a new set of carriage doors
- £25,000 will help fund vital facilities to conserve historic Island railway artefacts and archives
- £50,000 will renovate Havenstreet station building
- £100,000 will build a replica trailer car for the Ryde Pier Tram
- £250,000 will provide an extension to our refreshment rooms
- £500,000 will pay for the restoration of a complete train of Oldbury carriages
- £750,000 will provide a purpose-built locomotive workshop
- £1.25 million will pay for the construction of a 'new' Island locomotive



A generous bequest enabled us to acquire the sole surviving E1 class locomotive for eventual use on our Railway.

WHY WE NEED MORE THAN TICKET SALES

Revenue from passenger fares and the profit from shop and refreshment room sales cover our day-to-day running costs but will never pay for the many major developments needed to move the Railway forward. Legacies have already provided vital funding for past achievements and will remain essential to our future success.

What recent legacies have done for us

- Provided a significant part of the matching funding required to obtain the Heritage Lottery Fund grant that delivered Train Story
- Contributed greatly to the restoration of lvatt locomotive 41313
- Financed the purpose-built volunteer hostel
- Provided the resources to purchase the El class locomotive No 2 Yarmouth and for its eventual restoration
- Financed the purchase of a piece of land adjacent to Havenstreet station that is vital to our future expansion plans

- In the long term, the building of a 'new' Island locomotive
